### Our Purpose.

Project Ready's Historical & Cultural Literacy (the ability to investigate and think critically about the past in order to intellectually and creatively engage with the present) program seeks to provide youth with accurate, culturally relevant, and resonant curricula on the Black urban experience in America. In doing so, Project Ready: Historical & Cultural Literacy (HCL) empowers youth participants with positive images of themselves grounded in a historical legacy of commitment, leadership, and service that continues to positively shape the social, economic, intellectual, political, and cultural development of their community and the nation at large.

Through this dynamic National Urban League enhancement, Urban League affiliate staff expose youth to an important part of their history by investigating



and documenting The Great Migration and the ways that it led to the founding of the Urban League in their community and across the nation. As participants in *Project Ready:* HCL, youth become knowledgeable about how they can be active participants in shaping service, scholarship, and progress in their community as a part of the next generation of civil rights leaders.

#### FOSTERING PERSONAL, SOCIAL, INTELLECTUAL, AND POLITICAL EMPOWERMENT

As an instructional tool, *Project Ready:* HCL empowers youth participants by:

- ENGAGING them in real-life historical and cultural literacy activities such as oral history projects where they critically read historical and primary source documents, write strong interview questions, and develop public speaking skills via their presentations
- ENCOURAGING them to interact with peers and adults as well as to participate in robust, independent learning
- TEACHING them to question and explore in multiple contexts, to analyze information, and to draw meaning from resources
- CONNECTING them with civic engagement activities in their own local community
- COACHING them to be critical thinkers and creative problem solvers



### Our Approach.

The opportunities we put forth in Project Ready encourage youth to make an investment in themselves, their communities, their peers, and their future. We do this through program activities that have an asset-based focus on leadership development, intellectual and academic development, and peer learning.

#### AS A PART OF OUR ONGOING INTENTION,

we continue to replicate our *Project Ready* standards and approaches throughout all the Urban League postsecondary success programs, thus paving the way to break ground for additional high-quality programs, curricula, innovations, and professional developments that are both effective and impactful for participants and staff alike.

To this end and due to the ever-growing need to address the lack of culturally relevant and historically accurate curricula on the African American experience and the larger African Diaspora, the National Urban League partnered with the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, supported by State Farm, in order to develop an approach that would

meaningfully prepare youth for the 21st century via an historical and critical examination of the Black experience in America throughout centuries. The curricula would not be as vibrant or impactful without the guidance and support of Vie Kaufman, the National Urban League's Historian.

Lessons from *Project Ready:* HCL afford youth the opportunity to learn more about their communities, to tie the challenges of the past to the present circumstances that they face, to develop solutions to long-standing and emergent problems, to work on intergenerational projects, to develop service and oral history projects, and to deepen their commitment to the principles of leadership, service, and community.

### The 5-Part HCL Curriculum.

Through the National Urban League's Project Ready enhancement, Project Ready: HCL, our goal is for youth participants to deepen their knowledge, appreciation, and skills via a projectbased learning and asset-based approach. Specifically, we want youth to better connect with the legacy of service, leadership, and sacrifice of their ancestors and elders, via oral history projects, video and audio storytelling, photo essays, and art projects as they develop their own lines of inquiry and research and explore how they will make their own contributions to the community's story.

### Success Stories.



#### THE URBAN LEAGUE OF ROCHESTER'S

Project Ready: HCL program empowers their youth participants through a four-pronged focus:

(1) approximate the project that the state of adjusting them.

(1) exposing them to what the state of education was before and during the Civil Rights Movement and after the ruling in the landmark civil rights case

Brown vs. Board of Education; (2) examining the current educational climate in Rochester and picturing how it should evolve in the future; (3) strengthening their youth's advocacy skills, critical thinking, and creativity by coaching them to use their voices to positively affect and energize the Urban League Movement; and (4) helping them to gain an understanding of what they can do to bring positive change to their community.

These objectives are certainly exemplified in the HCL Legacy Video produced in 2018 by this league's *Project Ready* youth, which focused on the impact of The Great Migration, the National Urban League, and the Urban League of Rochester. The students interviewed their league's founder, Dr. Walter Cooper as well as other legacies involved in their community from the 1960's until now.



#### THE KNOXVILLE AREA URBAN LEAGUE has

passionately created two Historical and Cultural Literacy videos since the launch of the National Urban League's *Project Ready:* HCL enhancement program. The first, in 2014, was entitled EMPOWER YOURSELF! EMPOWER YOUR COMMUNITY!

EMPOWER THE NATION! It highlighted 8+ minutes of narrative and footage developed by this league's youth who participated in the *Project Ready:* HCL Legacy Project that year.



The second was created in 2018 by a group of this league's National Achievers Society scholars and was pivotal in helping these youth learn about the Civil Rights Movement and its impact on Knoxville. In preparation for developing this

documentary, the students did a great deal of research in order to identify which individuals they wanted to interview for their video. These scholars prepped for and then passionately interviewed local leaders in order to gain their perspectives on the Civil Rights Movement, past and present, and how the Urban League played a role. The local leaders interviewed were: Dr. Harold Middlebrook, a civil rights activist and Urban League board member; Phyllis Nichols, President/CEO of the Knoxville Urban League; and Gwen McKenzie, Knoxville City Council Representative and Urban League board member.

THE URBAN LEAGUE OF GREATER HARTFORD'S

Project Ready Empowers project celebrates and chronicles their league's history via a 2018 documentary produced and directed by their youth participants. Through the development of this HCL Legacy video, these young Urban League

of Greater Hartford (ULGH) scholars came to understand the grand contributions made by their league's past and present local heroes, which helped them to recognize the necessity of building on the legacy they have inherited.

Interviews conducted by the youth included: Patricia Kelly, a community activist, pioneering cow girl, entrepreneur, Vietnam veteran, and pillar in their urban community; Kyle Anderson, an employee of the CT Department of Consumer Protection, former City Councilman, and lifelong Urban Leaguer; descendants of William "Bill" Brown, 'Father' of the ULGH; and David Hopkins, current President/CEO of ULGH. These youth now know more about the Hartford community and its pioneers. More importantly, they see the role they can play in shaping, contributing, and impacting their community.
