

# Our Purpose.

*Project Ready:* Mentor helps students to progress academically and intellectually, benefit from enrichment opportunities, and develop important skills, attitudes, and aptitudes that position them well for success during and after high school.

This National Urban League signature program enhancement is funded by grants from the AbbVie Foundation, the United States Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), and a range of foundations and corporations. The program specifically targets 11 to 18-year-old African American and other urban youth who are particularly vulnerable to disengagement from school, community, and the workforce.



# Community Outreach.

The *Project Ready:* Mentor program helps local communities and institutions across the country to develop the internal resources needed to support youth through robust national and local partnerships. This is accomplished by:

- EXPANDING THE SUPPLY of well-trained mentors and mentoring supports
- INTENTIONALLY ADDRESSING youth development and wellness, community violence, and stressors
- CREATING AND SUSTAINING
   meaningful and supportive relationships
   between caring adults and youth, directing
   those relationships toward reducing
   behaviors that undermine youth well being, and increasing educational and
   employment success
- O CONNECTING youth development specialists, youth health and wellness experts, mentors, and a wide set of community members (civic leaders, law enforcement, juvenile justice, social workers, etc.) via positive relationshipbuilding, constructive dialogue, and a clear focus on postsecondary success.





Readying students through social, cultural, and academic supports and opportunities designed to aid in their transition to and through high school, to graduation, and onto postsecondary success.

**Our Approach**. Youth success is often chiefly attributed to school-based factors, yet academic accomplishment is not the only consideration. Rather, in order to grow into responsible adults, youth require a range of appropriate supports, services, and opportunities, only some of which exist in their communities and home lives. These opportunities and supports can exist in a mentor relationship, in a community-based program, or in an internship. For the majority of urban and vulnerable youth, the location of meaningful relationships and opportunities matters far less than their sustained presence and their quality.

Project Ready: Mentor uses two approaches:

RELATIONAL APPROACH:
Aims to develop senses of agency and efficacy and a close, trusting emotional connection between the mentor and mentee via activities, such as reading and discussing books or magazine articles where there is common interest or volunteering together.

INSTRUMENTAL APPROACH:
Focuses primarily on encouraging the
mentee to grow and learn through goaloriented activities found in Project Ready,
including going on college visits together,
working on projects such as flying drones,
building youth voice and agency via service
and leadership activities, or developing a
small business/entrepreneur plan together.

# Our Partners.

In our design, mentors are required to complete a pre-match course, attend an in-person or virtual workshops, and complete additional web-based courses early post-match, via Mentoring Central.

  INNOVATION RESEARCH & TRAINING (iRT), which solves
  significant real-world problems facing children, adolescents, families,
  communities, and organizations by developing and evaluating the effectiveness
  of innovative prevention programs and other services based upon the most
  current scientific findings, methods, and best practices.
- Our second *Project Ready:* Mentor partner and contractor is **MENTOR:**The National Mentoring Partnership. For over 25 years,
  MENTOR has served the mentoring field by providing a public voice, developing and delivering resources to mentoring programs nationwide, driving mentor recruitment, and promoting quality standards for mentoring through cuttingedge research and state-of-the-art tools.
- Our third partner is **KUDER**, **INC.**, which provides online evidence-based career assessment, education planning, and guidance resources to students via Kuder Navigator<sup>®</sup>. By using Navigator's exploration and preparation tools, *Project Ready:* Mentor participants learn how their interests, passions, skills, and values connect to potential education and career pathways, making it easier to establish and achieve their goals.

# Advisory Councils.

To better coordinate and leverage community resources, *Project Ready:* Mentor requires National Urban League affiliates to establish a local Advisory Council to provide program oversight and opportunities to leverage additional resources and support for program success and sustainability.



The following are specifically represented in varied combinations on local Advisory Councils:

School and district leadership

Local youth-serving institutions

Business and industry leaders

Representatives from higher education and key public health agencies

Linkages with juvenile and criminal justice agencies and professionals, including those advocating for restorative justice, trauma-informed, and pro-social approaches.

# Enrichments.

The National Urban League's grant from the OJJDP provides funding for affiliates to send youth, staff members, and mentors to our annual Youth Leadership Summit, as well as to the annual National Urban League's Whitney M. Young, Jr. Leadership Development Conference for professional development opportunities. We have also enhanced the *Project Ready*: Mentor program by introducing two online supports:

A program data tool powered by CiviCRM that allows the National Urban League to track program enrollment and achievements.

A college and career-readiness tool—Kuder Navigator®—
for all *Project Ready*: Mentor youth and their mentors to use
as the youth prepare for their futures.
