P&A: What is your role at the National Urban League?

AH: I am Senior Director of Education Policy and Advocacy and work within the Education and Youth Services division on our out-of-school programs, Project Ready, Youth Council, and Youth Leadership Summit, as well as on our education policy and advocacy initiatives.

P&A: Tell us more. What do the out-of-school programs do?



### **ADVOCACY IN ACTION**

At our inaugural Empowerment Summit in Washington, D.C., we released the 2024 State of Black America® The Civil Rights Act of 1964: 60 Years Later.

This historic legislation, which has fostered unprecedented, steady progress toward equality in our nation, is under threat by extremists, state and federal legislatures, and the judiciary system.

To be clear, Black America is strong, proud, and resilient, and we will not, on our watch, allow for the erasure of 60 years of progress and gains.

AH: <u>Education happens everywhere</u>. It starts at home, follows you through your traditional school day, and occurs in all the spaces before, after, and in between.

Our out-of-school programs prepare young people for college and career and really demystify the process for them. Project Ready includes activities like college tours, company site visits, speaker series, internships, and mentorship. We meet each child where they are and focus on personalized support to help them identify and pursue their unique goals. Also, through the Youth Council and Youth Leadership Summit, young people connect virtually and in person, have opportunities to gain leadership and technical skills through hands on projects, and overall, build confidence and community that will stick with them.

## P&A: Why are the out-of-school programs important to the young people served?

We are building young African American leaders, learning, exposure, and mentorship are a big part of that journey. For me, I had strong mentors growing up, however too many African Americans, experience a dearth of people modeling leadership. "Young people thrive when they have support, are sufficiently challenged, and are given opportunities. And that is what we do".

I encourage you to read the special report titled Evaluation for Progress on the Biden-Harris Administration, and our 2024 Equity Index, which measures progress toward all of our economic empowerment areas like education, employment, housing, health, and civic engagement.

# P&A: What is your role at the National Urban League?

KM: I lead the Business Executive Exchange Program (BEEP), a legacy initiative, founded in **1969** (Black Executive Exchange Program), was recently relaunched and expanded in 2022.

## P&A: Tell us about your work. What does the BEEP program do?

KM: We partner with select corporations, HBCUs, and other educational institutions to expose undergraduate/graduate students and alumni to diverse career paths, early career opportunities, and a network of professionals. It is a platform for ongoing learning and development via paid internships, online courses, on and off campus events, and more. To put it simply, we educate

Last year, the National Urban League's 13
Entrepreneurship Centers secured \$71.5 million in new contracts and financing for small business and provided management resources and support to over 25,600 entrepreneurs to help start, grow, and sustain their businesses.

Ed Dixon, artist and owner of the fine art gallery, Edward A. Dixon Gallery in Dayton, OH, is part of this success.

Ed first opened his gallery in 2016, steadily growing from humble beginnings to a global convergence of art worldwide – from Cuba to Liberia, and Canada to the New Zealand and beyond.

Like many small businesses, the Covid-19 pandemic forced Ed to downsize, but by August 2022, he reopened and was ready to expand.

young people on what they can be and show them the way.

P&A: Why is BEEP important to the young people served?

KM: Being privy to the game helps young people make better decisions, more confident decisions, and earlier decisions that will impact their career and life. For myself, I did not know all the opportunities available and how to apply my degree, how to network and the importance of it, and how an internship can prepare you for an entry level position and career advancements. Young people in the BEEP program learn core skills early, both how to use their hard skills to fulfill a job function and how to develop soft skills to navigate any workplace culture. Our young people are 80% minority backgrounds, and often first-generation college students, the exposure to these opportunities is life changing.

P&A: In your own words why is it important to support NUL?

KM: No other organization has the reach to change communities, transform individual lives and advocate for what is needed.

By connecting with his local Urban League Affiliate, Ed began to invest in marketing and operations. He participated in one-on-one sessions and in the Access to Capital workshop.

He received funding from the Dayton Resiliency Fund, and the pinnacle, secured a \$10,000 loan from the Small Business Administration.

Through unwavering determination, strategic collaboration, and relentless pursuit of opportunities, the Edward A. Dixon Gallery stands as a testament to resilience, resourcefulness, and the power of community support.


### **Upcoming Signature Events**
