FACES OF THE MOVEMENT

Angela R. Simmons-Smith serves as the President of the National Urban League Council of Guilds and a Trustee of the National Urban League.

P&A: How did you first get involved with the National Urban League?

AS: I first became a member when I moved back to my hometown of Philadelphia. I wanted to make a difference in our community. Having previously volunteered with the NAACP, a few friends from my local church invited me to a meeting with the Urban League. I loved it! It was a multi-generational, diverse group of individuals, and I immediately felt at home. I joined committees that aligned with my passions-career development, social action, and fundraising-and was able to make an impact right away.

P&A: This year, you're celebrating 31 years of service to the National Urban League. What has kept you engaged with the NCULG?

AS: It's been a true blessing. My volunteer work has expanded my circle and connected me with incredible people—some who were involved in the Civil Rights Movement of the 50s and 60s, and others who are today's activists. I've grown so much as both a person and a leader, encouraged by mentors who urged me to take on leadership roles: Committee Chair, Eastern Regional Director, Treasurer, Vice President, and now President. It's become the fabric of my life.

P&A: As you step into your new role as President of the NCULG, what values and goals do you have for the Guild?

AS: I truly believe each Guilder brings something unique to the table, and embracing those qualities will only strengthen the NCULG. My goals include increasing membership, continuing our educational webinar series, creating more community-driven programs led by the Guild, and improving our communication through social media and a new newsletter.

P&A: If someone is interested in joining their local Guild, what opportunities are available to them?

AS: Bring your skills and passions! We welcome everyone. If you're a teacher, you can mentor students or facilitate professional development. If you work in healthcare, you can help with community health awareness events. If you're into marketing, we have social media and communication needs. There's a place for everyone to get involved and make a difference.

P&A: Why is it important to get involved?

AS: I believe to affect change, you have to be an active participant. The National Urban League has been around for over 100 years, and we're making a real difference in communities across the country. For anyone unsure how to help, we offer a proven platform to join with others who are dedicated to making an impact. The more people involved, the more we can achieve!

P&A: Can you share a moment when you witnessed the impact of your volunteer work?

AS: As a Black woman and mother, education is incredibly important to me. I once co-chaired a career development program where we partnered with a local community college. We focused on reaching students who might not be A or B students—those who often slip through the cracks. Our first event featured a career panel with small business owners, community workers like firemen and police officers, tradespeople, beauticians, and more. I noticed one young man slouched in the back, uninterested. I asked him what his plans were after graduation, and he said he planned to get a job. Weeks later, after he completed the program, I asked how he felt about it. His response was completely different—he was excited and had realized that there were more career options for him than he had ever considered. This is why we do this work.

P&A: Why is it important to support the National Urban League and local Urban League Affiliates?

AS: Supporting the National Urban League—both financially and through service—is crucial. We advocate for our community, especially Black and Brown people, with a focus on creating real opportunities. Whether it's providing scholarships that make the difference between going to college or not, offering mentorship programs that open doors, or helping people navigate homeownership and financial challenges, we're making a tangible difference. **Together, we can move mountains and make big strides in the fight for diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging**.
